

Since our last update, the Plant Protection Division (PPD) has remained actively engaged in Yellow-Legged Hornet (YLH) surveillance and response. Between April 17 and April 30, 2025, 12 hornets were discovered, largely thanks to the 2,039 traps deployed across the area by PPD. As the year progresses, embryo nests will transition into primary nests, marking a critical phase in the hornet's life cycle.
